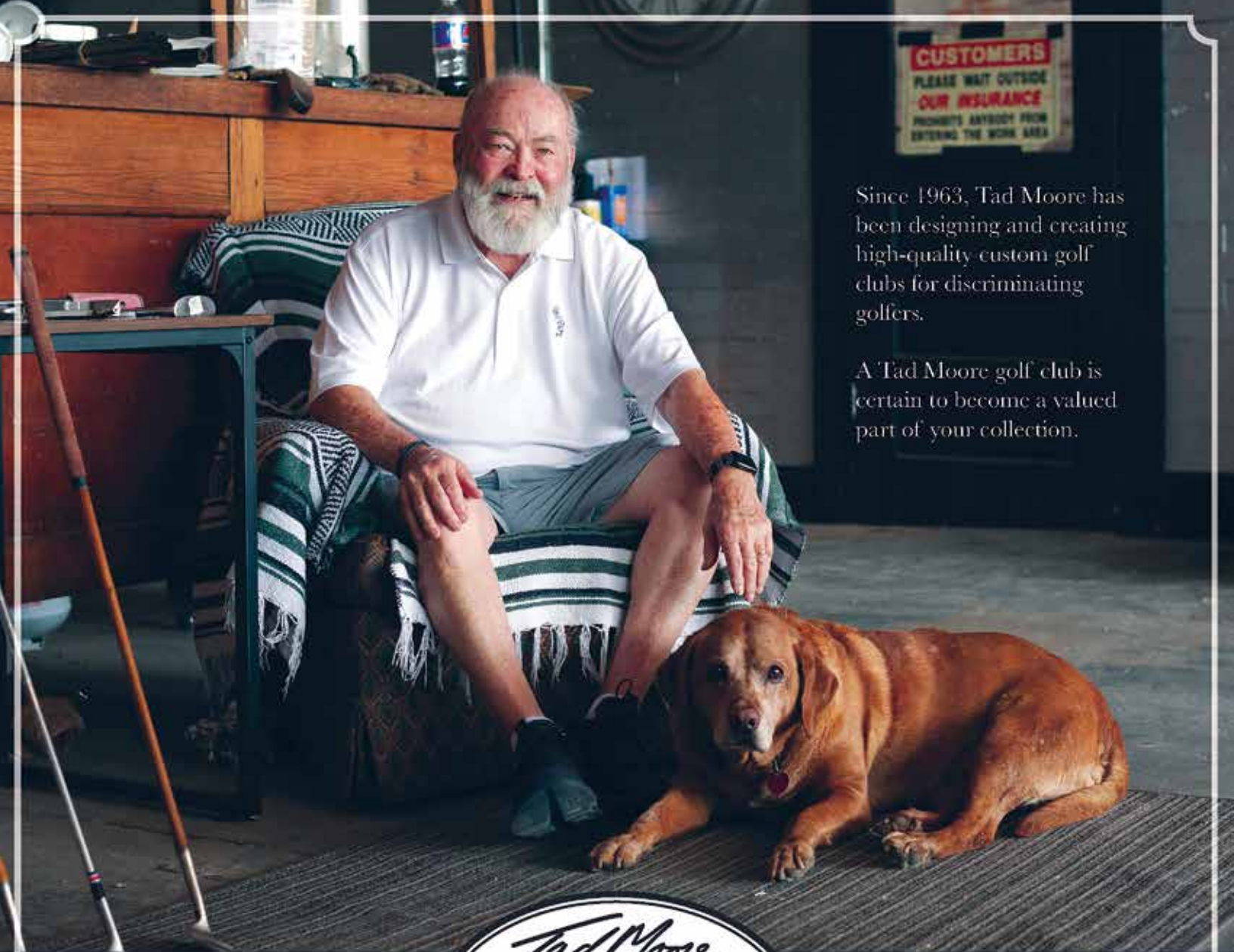

General Manager/Director of Golf

A native Arkansan from Benton, Barry has been involved with golf since he was 8 years old. He was a First Team All WVIAC golfer three out of four years at West Liberty. In 2006, he won the South Central Section Srixon Assistants Championship. Willie Park Jr. was prolific golf course designer

He had an impeccable golf pedigree, indeed, one not to be matched. His father won the first Open Championship in 1860 at the Prestwick Golf Club, as well as additional Open titles in 1863, 1866, and 1875. His uncle, Mungo Park, won the 1874 Open. And he himself won the 1887 and 1889 Open Championships at Prestwick and Musselburgh Links, respectively.

Not content with just playing championship courses, and not incidentally because professional golf was not lucrative at the time, Willie Park Jr. decided to take his golfing knowledge and start building courses. In doing so, he became something of a transatlantic architectural prodigy. It has been noted that, with few exceptions, the works of James Braid, Harry S. Colt and Herbert Fowler were known primarily for their works in the United Kingdom. Across the Atlantic, designers such as Donald Ross, C.B. Macdonald and Walter Travis, had plenty to do in North America, working primarily on those shores.

Park, however, designed or renovated some 170 courses in the gold years of golf in the 20th century, roughly divided between Europe and North America.

Somehow, he also found time to manufacture golf balls and clubs (taking after his father) and even turned his hand to writing. His 1896 book, *The Game of Golf*, is considered the first book ever written by a golf professional.

Despite other, earlier, courses, Park drew acclaim for his design of the Old Course at Sunningdale Golf Club in the heathland district south of London, home to several great inland courses. Other notable courses of his in England include Huntercombe Golf Club west of London and Notts Golf Club in Nottingham.

Near his home in Musselburgh, just east of Edinburgh, Scotland, Park is known for the Kilspindie Golf Club, a celebrated links in East Lothian. He also worked on the No. 2 and No. 3 Courses at nearby Gullane Golf Club. Park's lone Northern Ireland course, Portstewart's Strand Course, is often described as one of the greatest links in the British Isles.

Much of his later work is to be found in North America, most of this in the Northeast but several courses appearing elsewhere as his time and fortunes allowed. One of these, of course, is the Park Course at the Hot Springs Country Club, venue for the 2025 U.S. Hickory

Open; another is the Calgary Golf & Country Club in Alberta, Canada. One shining achievement is the Maidstone Club in East Hampton, N.Y., a course he tinkered with for more than 25 years. Park also designed the North Course at Olympia Fields Country Club in suburban Chicago, which hosted the 2003 U.S. Open.

Park, who was known for his uncanny putting abilities, put those skills to use in creating challenging putting greens so that great putters might separate themselves from the pack. The aforementioned Huntercombe is home to a short par-4, the 4th, with a wild, multi-tiered putting surface. Parks' stateside courses tend to be known less for brutal length than pitched, rolling greens. The 18th green at Shuttle Meadow Country Club, a Park design south of Hartford, Conn., is a marvel, with three tiers that rise six feet from front to back.

Biographers generally note that Park worked himself to death at the relatively young age of 61 in 1925. He regimen of traveling between North America and the U.K., and even covering the vast distances in the States eventually took its toll. He had been brought home to Scotland by family in his last months and was laid to rest at Inveresk Churchyard in his home town of Musselburgh. More than any of his contemporaries, he bridged a gap between the United Kingdom and the United States by designing notable golf courses on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean. ~

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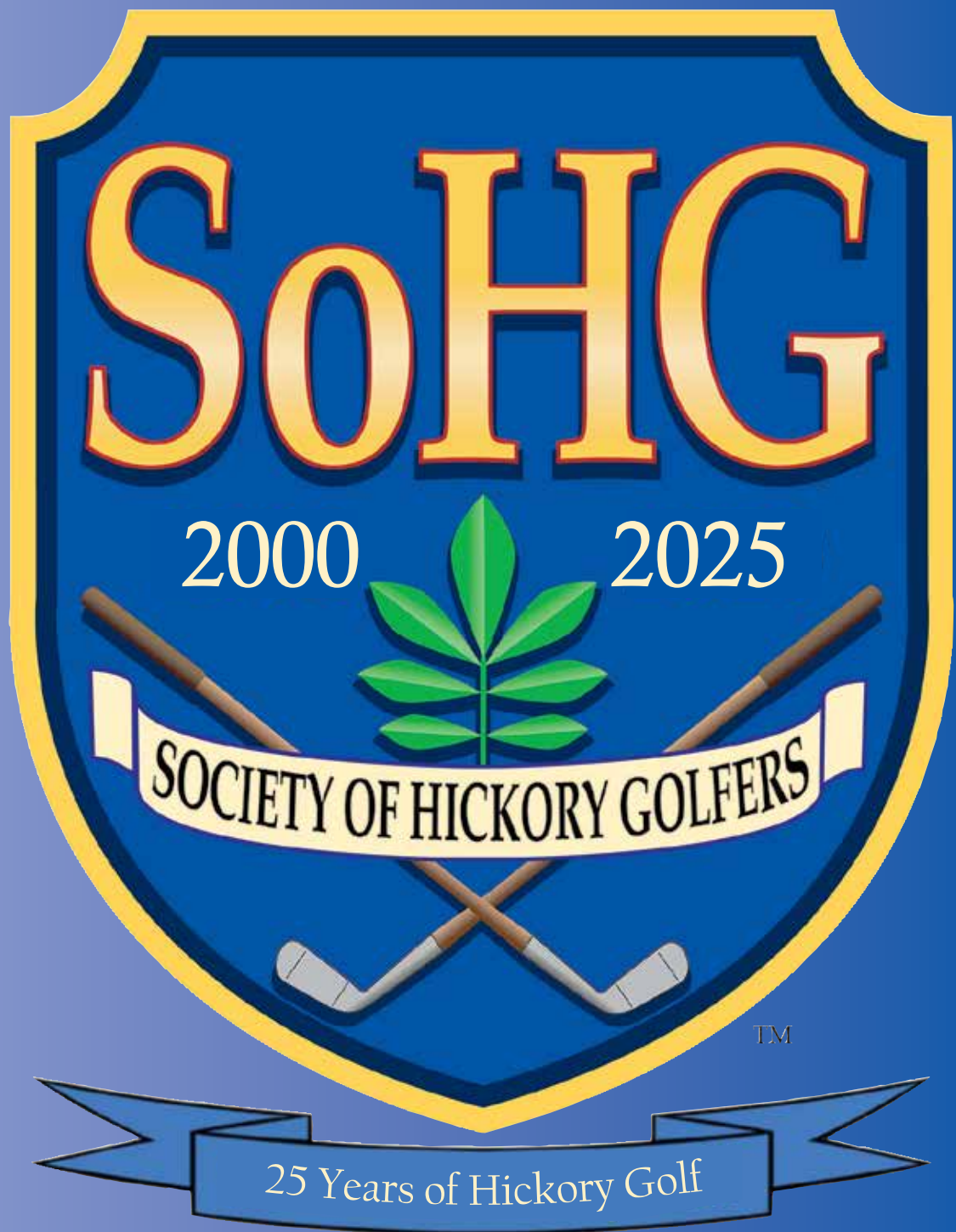

Not often do you get to spend time with a character-filled 120-year-old club and have a chance to soak up the wealth of rich history it can provide. A visit to Hot Springs Country Club, one of America's oldest golf clubs, afforded us with a chance to experience a wealth of hallowed tales of the club, its former members and guests, along with being treated to some exceptional golf.

With roots back to 1898, the club has seen many changes to its facilities over the more than a century of golf in the National Park city. The club began as a Willie Park Jr.-designed nine-hole facility and, according to club GM Barry Howard, the chipping area green is said to be the last remnant of the original layout. Expansion to satisfy the demand for golf once saw the club home to three championship courses in its heyday.

The club now boasts two terrific old school designs: The Park named after Willie Park Jr.; and the Arlington, a William Diddel design, c. 1932, which is a former PGA tour stop from the 1950s. Both were renovated by Coore & Crenshaw in 1994 with the goal to return the bunkers and green complexes to the original stylings.

Formerly known as the Majestic, in tribute to one of the city's historic hotel properties lost in a fire, the Park Course is aptly named. This course is the kinder and gentler of the championship courses at the club features rolling fairways and challenging, yet accessible green sites. The routing reflects the

work of renovations, remodeling and downsizing from the club's 54 hole collection of years past.

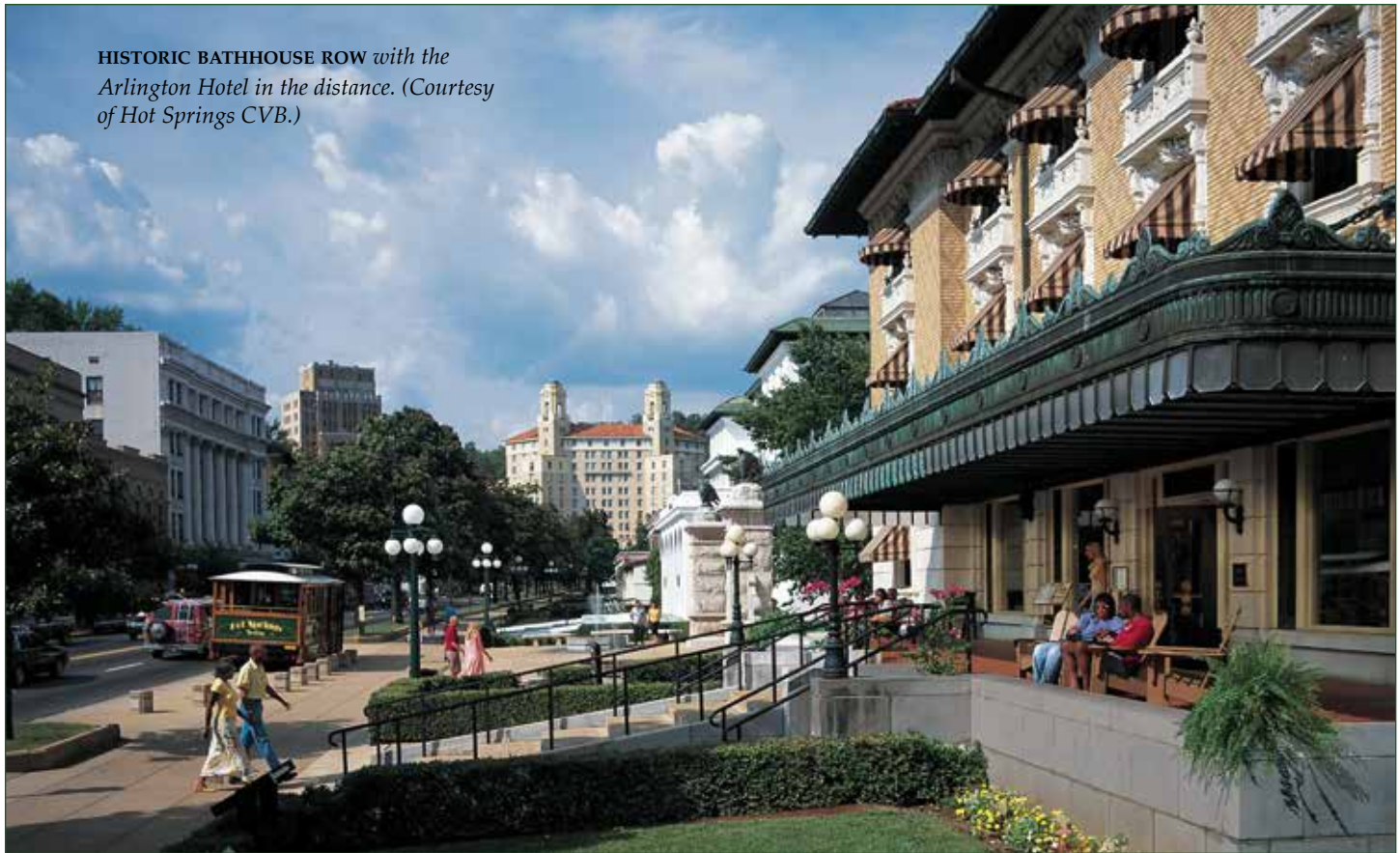
Characterized by, "What you see is what you get," the holes are generally straight with slight meanderings. Plenty of elevation change will be found throughout the round, none more dramatic than at the final par 3. The tee shot on 15th plays downhill from the magnificent clubhouse to a green tucked behind a narrow chute in a thicket of evergreens and then a pond short of the putting surface.

The farthest reaches of the course present a pair of strong designs at holes five and six. A crossing creek in the landing area of the drive gets your attention at the fifth hole. A raised green fronted by bunkers on the right side makes your approach to this par

5 a tricky task. The par 4 sixth hole cants left in the landing area and leaves you with an uphill or side hill lie from which to attack the bunker-less green complex high above. The finale is a big finish requiring a big poke with the drive which leaves a long iron or hybrid into another raised green site, this time set beside the striking facade of the clubhouse and watching eyes.

As a Natural State Golf Trail partner, the private club provides access to the hallowed grounds as part of a trail package. Very few clubs of this era and status are as welcoming to public guests. It is said that Babe Ruth was a frequent player when he was in town, which is no surprise given his love of golf and the quality of experience found at Hot Springs Country Club. ♪

Arkansas, birthplace of legendary country singer Johnny Cash, retired NBA star Scottie Pippen and former U.S. President Bill Clinton, is also home to an eclectic historic vacation destination where people have congregated for centuries. Hot Springs is about an hour southwest of the state capital Little Rock, wedged in a picturesque mountain valley within the Ouachita Foothills. Centuries of Native Americans tribes were drawn to the bubbling mineral springs percolating from the depths of the rock strata found in this geologically stunning corner of the world. French and Spanish explorers have been noted as encountering this medicinal meeting place as early as the 16th Century. It has been a favorite gathering place for generations ever since.

The attraction to the area's thermal springs from which the city draws its name, led to then President Andrew Jackson designating the region as a National Reservation in 1832. This was the first ever example of the U.S. Federal government protecting a significant natural asset for Americans to enjoy. The city's famous Bathhouse Row brought throngs of tourists to the city, eventually leading to numerous hotels and turning Hot Springs into a tourist destination.

According to the city's published history, the early legacy of Hot Springs was surrounded in the salty and nefarious

activities associated with the establishment of illegal gambling houses. A pair of local families controlled the city's gaming parlors which eventually became a draw to some of the country's most notorious gangsters, many regularly seen spending time in the numerous speakeasies and hotels. Gambling continues at the Oaklawn Racing Casino Resort which features seasonal thoroughbred racing and year round games of chance. The city's remarkable mobster past is also noted with numerous museums and displays paying tribute to the time of prohibition and the Tommy Gun. Room 443 of the iconic Arlington Hotel was the favorite haunt of legendary gangster Al Capone. According to the hotel lore, Capone and his entourage would command an entire floor complete with a hidden escape route should something sinister occur.

Baseball fans can immerse themselves in another of many reasons why Hot Springs became known as America's First Resort. In 1886 the manager of the Chicago White Stockings, now Cubs, brought his team south to begin the tradition now known as "Spring Training." In short time, the city expanded its baseball facilities to encourage more and more players to come south for the warmth and mineral springs. This continued for many years and saw numerous baseball legends spend time in Hot Springs. The interactive Hot Springs Baseball Trail pays tribute to the many locations and such legendary figures of the game as Stan Musial, Honus Wagner and Jackie Robinson, who spent time in the city honing their skills in the city, getting ready for a season of games in the "Big Leagues." ~

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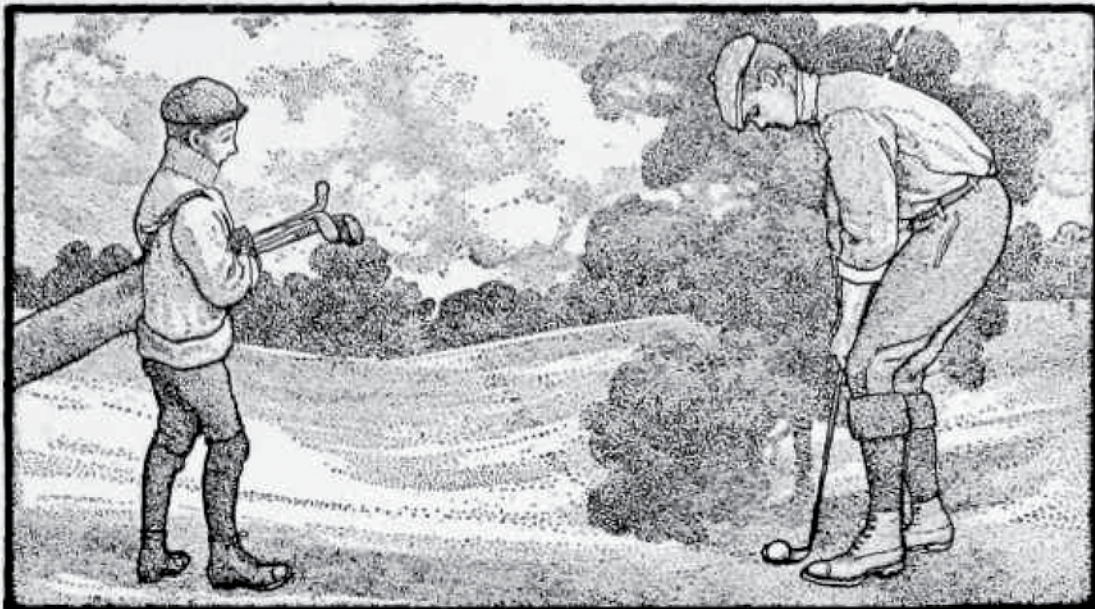
